

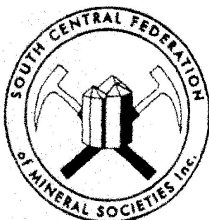

June 12, 2010 – AGMC Field Trip to TXI Quarry

At 8:45 am, we met at the TXI guard building to turn in our forms and receive hard hats and safety glasses in return. Then TXI provided us a guide to lead our car caravan back into the labyrinth of the TXI cement facility at Midlothian, TX to one quarry. There we



had two hours to hunt fossils, sharks teeth, pyrite or whatever we found that we liked. Luck varied among the 15 of use who came. Bob and I found a few small pieces of pyrite and 3 so-so shark teeth plus one that was so tiny it is amazing I managed to keep track of it. Steve Williams, in the picture at the left,

found several large shark teeth. Others attendees also found nice teeth and several large pieces of pyrite. On one wall of the quarry a fish fossil was visible, but not where we could recover it. The weather cooperated – it was cooler, overcast with a light breeze.

Afterwards, the highlight was the barbeque at Beth and Jack Spinks house. They live in Midlothian, about a mile as the crow flies from where we were digging. However, to reach their house was not a path that any sober crow would have taken. Thanks to the Spinks for feeding the hungry fossil hunters. The July field trip will be to the Fort Worth Museum of Science and History on July 10 to see the Leonardo da Vinci models.

**WORTH THE TRIP: WILLIAM HOLLAND SCHOOL OF LAPIDARY ARTS**

How much fun can you have during a one-week vacation in the foothills of the southern Appalachian Mountains for only \$310? At William Holland School of Lapidary Arts, \$310 buys you a whole week of room and board and instruction in one of many lapidary-related skills by enthusiastic and talented instructors who volunteer their time. There are even programs for junior rockhounds, so it can be a family vacation.

Located on the border between Georgia and North Carolina, William Holland will be celebrating its 25<sup>th</sup> anniversary next year. The school was envisioned by Harold and Mary Lou Sparks while Mr. Sparks was president of the Southeast Federation of Mineralogical Societies (SFMS). With the help of many passionate members of various rock clubs, the school was created. When it came time to choose a name for the new school, Harold chose William Holland who was the 3rd President of the SFMS and the only deceased president at the time. Even before the lodge was ready, classes unofficially started in the basement of the Sparks' home. Finally, in the spring of 1986, the newly completed lodge held the very first official classes.

The main building, Sparks Lodge, contains the classrooms, cafeteria, and the original accommodations. Rocking chairs on the surround porch offer a chance to enjoy the mountain views and to watch the birds during the day and the lightning bugs at night. Each room in Sparks Lodge has a plaque honoring the individual or lapidary club that donated time, talents, and money to construct and finish out that room.

The school operates on a seasonal basis, offering classes from April through November. While it was 100 degrees here in Fort Worth, I woke up to 60 degree mountain mornings. By the time the temperature reached the daily high in the low 80's, I was well into my class on metal forming. The classrooms are well-appointed and basic tools are provided for the students, although you are welcome to bring your own favorites.

Being in the foothills of the southern Appalachian mountains, the area is surrounded by galleries featuring examples of local and regional craft. I found everything from locally made pine-needle baskets to pottery, handwovens, and woodturnings, some of which came home with me. Sight-seeing excursions revealed breathtaking waterfalls and ten-foot tall wild rhododendrons in bloom. Magnolia trees grow wild by the roadside. I was told that the area is technically considered a rain forest, which is why everything is so green. Not far down the road are many local gem and mineral mines where you can search for precious gemstones, and there are several good rock shops in the area if you'd rather search shelves than dirt.

For more information, visit [www.lapidaryschool.org](http://www.lapidaryschool.org). Driving from Fort Worth, we stopped overnight each way in Meridian, Mississippi. However, you can fly into Atlanta and rent a car for the short drive north. All in all, it is well worth the trip.
